Flying school for the Churt starling flock in a good breeding season

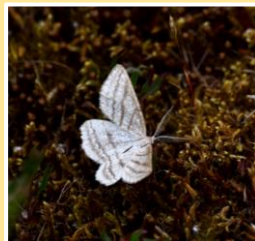
